

AN ORDINANCE BY THE VILLAGE OF FELICITY, REGULATING LOITERING,
PROVIDING PENALTIES AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, for the purpose of maintaining the public order and protecting each person's right to the unobstructed use of municipal sidewalks and public ways, the Village of Felicity enacts the following ordinance to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Village of Felicity:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Felicity, that it shall be unlawful for any person to loiter on any street, sidewalk, overpass or public place.

For the purpose of this article, loitering is defined as the act of standing, sitting or idling in or about any street, sidewalk, overpass or public place so as to hinder or impede or tend to hinder or impede the passage of pedestrians or vehicles.

Any violation of the foregoing may be punishable by a fine of up to \$100.00.

This Ordinance is deemed an emergency for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Village of Felicity and shall be in full force and effect at the earliest possible time allowed by law.
